

MANNA AND QUAILS

Old Testament Lesson #39

After Israel crossed the Red Sea, they traveled in a southerly direction, roughly parallel to the Red Sea. After 30 days, they came to camp in the Desert of Sin, which is between Elim and Mount Sinai. The whole community began to grumble against Moses and Aaron. They complained because their food provisions were not what they wanted. Back in Egypt, they had plenty to eat. Now they blamed Moses for taking them into the desert to starve.

God told Moses that he was going to provide bread from heaven. In addition, Moses and Aaron told the people that in the evening, God would provide meat for them to eat.

That night, quails came and covered the camp so that the people were able to capture and eat them.

In the morning, a layer of dew covered the ground. When the dew was gone, there were "thin flakes like frost" on the ground. The people asked each other, "What is it?" Moses told them it was the bread the LORD had given them. Each person was to gather as much as he needed to eat each morning. Nothing was to be kept for the following day, but some people did not listen. Those who kept it found that by the next morning, it had spoiled. On the morning before the Sabbath, however, the people were to gather enough for two days. The bread did not spoil for the Sabbath. God provided daily all the bread that they needed. No bread appeared on the ground on the Sabbath.

The people called this bread "manna," which means, "What is it?" The bread was described as being "white like coriander seed and tasted like wafers made with honey."

POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- Throughout the 40 years in the wilderness, God provided bread for the Israelites. The provisioning continued until Israel entered the Promised Land under Joshua. When Israel could eat of the fruit of the Promised Land, God ceased to provide the Manna (see Joshua 5:12; compare with Exodus 16:35).
- Jesus described himself as the "true bread from heaven." He told the people of his day, "I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry, and he who believes in me will never be thirsty" (John 6:35). See dialogue of John 6:25-71.

 - E. Some people didn't listen to Moses, and their bread spoiled.
 - F. On the morning before the Sabbath, they were to gather two days worth of manna.
 - G. The people called the bread "manna," which means "What is it?"


